

Aarhus is the second-largest city in Denmark and the seat of Aarhus Municipality. It is located on the eastern shore of Jutland in the Kattegat Sea and approximately 187 northwest of Copenhagen. Founded in the early Viking Age, Aarhus is one of the oldest cities in Denmark and now the city is our host for the second edition of <u>Tech Tour Water Tech Programme</u>.

1. How to Get to the city of Aarhus?

There is an **airport** near the city of Aarhus. The distance from it to the center of Aarhus is 41 km. By car, it takes 40 minutes to get to the center of Aarhus.



By taxi, it takes 40 minutes; price from 95 EUR. You could **Book a taxi**.



By bus, it takes 50 -60 minutes, price: from 15 EUR.

The Airport bus (925X) gives you the opportunity to travel to and from the city, it leaves in accordance with flight arrival and departure times. The departure point of the shuttle is in front of the airport and takes 50 minutes to reach Aarhus Central Station (Banegårdspladsen). There are also stops along the itinerary. Tickets are available from the bus driver and cost 115 DKK for adults and 80 DKK for children up to 15 years. You can pay by credit card and cash conveniently in various currencies - euros, pounds, dollars and crowns from Denmark, Norway and Sweden. Please consult timetable Airport bus and website Midttrafik for more information as there might be changes depending on the time you are travelling.

2. How to Get from Copenhagen to Aarhus?

Train: about 3 hours, from 20 EUR

Trains on Denmark's national rail service, DSB, are comfortable, speedy, and the best option for most people—provided that you reserve your place in advance. When purchasing tickets on the <u>DSB webpage</u>, the Copenhagen station appears in Danish as København H. The cheapest ticket option is called "DBH Orange," which is non-refundable and there are limited seats during non-peak times. If that's not available, the next ticket option is "DBH Orange Fri," which is fully refundable up to 30 minutes before the train departure. The "Standard" ticket is the next tier, which is valid for any train on the selected.

Bus: 3 hours, 40 minutes, from 25 EUR

The bus is a great last-minute option for getting to Aarhus. Buy tickets from **FlixBus**, which operates several buses throughout the day departing from Copenhagen directly to Aarhus. Be aware that there are two arrival options in Aarhus: Aarhus C (near the center of the town) and Aarhus Vest (out of the town, near the airport).

★ Sea Plane: 45minutes, from 135 EUR

For a faster and more exciting plane ride, <u>Nordic Seaplanes</u> carries passengers on small seaplanes between Copenhagen and Aarhus in 45 minutes. Because these aircraft take off and land on the water, they're able to depart and arrive next to each city center instead of being forced to use the far-off airports. It's the priciest way to travel between the two cities, but the seaplane is sure to be an unforgettable experience for your trip to Denmark.

Flight: 35 minutes (almost about 2-3 hours in total)

The flight from Copenhagen to Aarhus is essentially just taking off and landing, with total time in the air only 35–40 minutes on direct flights by SAS. Please, be aware that you should also consider the time to get to and from airports, go through security, and wait at your gate.

Car: 3 hours, (187 kilometers)

Renting a car gives you the freedom to explore Denmark. From Copenhagen, you have two options for getting to Aarhus, and even though one of them requires nearly twice as many miles of travel, both routes take about three hours if you drive straight through.

The drive with less mileage takes you up through the north part of the island of Zealand—where Copenhagen is located—to Odden on the northwest tip. In Odden, you'll have to board a ferry (www.molslinjen.com) with your car and cross the strait, a 75-minute ride that drops you off right in Aarhus. The price of the Ferry tickets increases depending on the time of your departure and the size of your vehicle. The second option is to drive through the center of the island and cross the Great Belt waterway over the Storebælt Bridge, before continuing north to Aarhus. It requires much more time behind the wheel, but the total trip time is about the same. The bridge has a toll.

3. How to Get from Billund Airport, Denmark to Aarhus, Denmark (94km)?

Billund Airport is located only 2km from the city of Billund, Denmark and is one of the busiest airports in the country.

Most major European airports are connected to Billund via multiple daily scheduled flights.

Car: 1 hour and 10-20 minutes, (94km)

Bus: 1hour and 20 minutes.

There are several direct buses from Billund to Aarhus. You could check and buy your ticket at Midttrafik.

4. How to Get from Hamburg, Germany to Aarhus, Denmark (340km)?

Bus (from the airport): about 5-6 hours, from 20 EUR

The bus is very comfortable and fast. You could select between a bus from Hamburg airport or from the city center. You could book your ticket from <u>FlixBus</u>.

Train: from 4 hours and 30 minutes, from 50EUR

There are at least two trains per day which arrive at Aarhus H - the main railway station in Aarhus.
